Although the flyover and General Sutton's appearance were cancelled, the USAF Band of The Rockies, the USAF High Frontier Honor Guard/Color guard and Chaplain of the Air Force Falcons Major Steve Sheik made the dedication a success.

Major Ron Doughty has been a driving force to keep the memorial rededication alive and well. On his way out here one year, he had to have heart surgery, but he checked himself out of the hospital the next day and drove to Cañon City in time for the festivities. The rest of us were a little concerned, but he said he was doing fine.

We missed him this year, but Sherif did a fine job planning the site seeing around the area and meals in the restaurants. The 12th Tact members all agreed that they looked forward to the wine tasting and catered dinner at the Winery every year and said this one was an exceptional year.

I think the members should be welcomed by some kind of a veterans group. I really enjoy being a part of it which happened several years ago when they made us honorary members. How I have appreciated it.

We thank the members and all veterans for their service and their dedication to our country. Hopefully, the 12th Tactical Fighter Wing will be back next year in full force.
